SOMERS POINT PARENT TEACHER ORGANIZATION (SP PTO)

The Somers Point Parent Teacher Organization (SP PTO) meets monthly to support and promote the educational, social, and emotional needs of the students of Somers Point. This organization works to bridge the gap between home and school by creating a cooperative and collaborative relationship between families and school staff, creating one school community working for the betterment of the Somers Point students and community. Membership is automatically granted to all parents/legal guardians of students in Somers Point Schools, as well as any Somers Point District Staff Members.

GRADING

The Somers Point School District will continue the use of a Hybrid Report Card for grades 4-8, incorporating a percentage score for each subject area, along with a standards-based score for level of understanding. This will enable staff to fully communicate what students are expected to know and be able to do according to the New Jersey Standards in addition to providing a score for achievement in the class based on a 100-point scale.

All report cards in grades 4 - 8 will have a hybrid report card, using both the percentages and the standards-based scale above. Students will be given the opportunity with their teachers to make up assignments and retake assessments as determined by the teacher. During the first trimester, conferences will be held. End of trimester report cards will be available in OnCourse Connect in December, March, and June.

ACADEMIC DISTINCTION

Students who show academic excellence throughout the trimester in all content areas, including specials and college and career readiness standards, will be recognized with "Academic Distinction."

JAG STARS

Students showing continued effort, hard work, and diligence throughout the trimester in all content areas, including specials and college and career readiness standards, will be recognized as "Jag Stars."

REPORT CARDS

Report cards are available in OnCourse Connect for all parents and students in grades 4-8. Please refer to the school calendar for end of trimester dates in December, March, and June. Our report card is designed to present an accurate

picture of how your child is progressing academically with regard to standards. Should you have any questions, please be sure to contact your student's teacher.

CONFERENCES

Strong home/school communication is essential to a student's success. Schoolwide conferences will take place in November. Parents/guardians will be notified of the dates and times. However, parents/guardians are encouraged to contact the appropriate school personnel if a question or concern arises. Please email or call the staff member you would like to talk to or meet with should a problem arise.

HOMEWORK / MAKE-UP WORK

Homework is an important part of the learning process. Research has shown that parental involvement in a child's learning is a key factor in school achievement and students who complete homework assignments have higher test results.

Students are expected to:

- Write down their assignments in the agenda book and make sure they understand all directions.
- Submit assignments to teachers on time.
- Check with the teachers promptly for assignments missed and turn them in as directed.
- Take pride in the quality of work submitted to the teachers.

Parents are expected to:

- Provide a study area free from distractions.
- Encourage children to do their best, be organized, and turn their work in on time.

WORK REQUESTS

Students who have been absent for any reason, including sickness, trips, suspensions, etc., are responsible for making up all homework and assignments missed during their absence. Students should contact their classroom teachers for any missed assignments upon their return to school/class. The time allowed to make up work is equal to the amount of time absent. If parents wish to request work, they should call the school before 9:30 am or email teachers directly. Homework assignments may be picked up between 2:40 pm and 3:15 pm in the school office.

FIELD TRIPS

Field trips are planned to enhance the academic program. If your child leaves school grounds, he/she must have a signed permission form. Telephone permission is not valid unless approved by the Principal. Students may be excluded due to an unacceptable discipline record and/or safety concerns. This exclusion will be at the discretion of the Principal.

STUDENT ELIGIBILITY

A student participating in extracurricular activities, athletic programs, school-sponsored events, and dances is expected to maintain passing grades. If a student athlete receives a Not Yet on their report card, the coach/advisor will inquire as to the reason the grade was given. If it is decided that the grade is due to lack of effort and progress in class, the athlete will become ineligible. A student can become eligible by meeting with the Guidance Counselor, developing an improvement plan, and demonstrating progress toward the improvement plan. The Principal will make that determination and may remove him/her from the ineligibility list.

DANCES / SCHOOL-SPONSORED EVENTS

Students are encouraged to get involved, participate, and attend dances and school-sponsored events. Various school organizations sponsor dances and events during the year for Jordan Road Middle School students only. Dances are held on designated Friday afternoons/evenings during advertised times. All school rules apply at all dances and events held at Jordan Road Middle School. Students are permitted to leave a dance/event early only if their parent/guardian comes in to pick them up. A student is ineligible and will be excluded from the dance/event if he/she has an excessive number of behavioral referrals prior to the dance. Academically ineligible students may not attend the dances or school-sponsored events.

*Students absent from school the day of the dance/event are not permitted to attend that dance/event.

*Students who are not picked up on time may jeopardize the privilege of attending the next dance/event.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES / ATHLETICS

The Jordan Road Middle School offers a variety of after school activities and athletics. These activities are designed to promote school spirit, develop students' leadership and service skills, and enable students to expand or explore interests and abilities. All students are encouraged to participate. Activities are considered privileges and students must be academically and behaviorally eligible in order to participate.

Students who wish to participate in sports must have a physical to try out for a sport. Dr. Raab is available throughout the school year to give physicals. Students will be informed when Dr. Raab will be at Jordan Road Middle School. The New Jersey Department of Education Athletic Pre-Participation Physical Examination Form is available in the Main Office at Jordan Road Middle School. Students participating in sports will also be expected to agree and adhere to the Jordan Road Middle School Athletic Contract.

Students must be picked up from sports, clubs, and or activities no later than 15 minutes after the conclusion of the activity or risk being unable to participate in future events.

NATIONAL JUNIOR HONOR SOCIETY

Being selected as a member of this organization is an honor and will be highly regarded upon entering high school. NJHS focuses and prides itself on the following five pillars of student excellence:

scholarship, character, leadership, service, and citizenship.

Requirements for Membership:

- Per national guidelines, at a minimum, students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 85% B, 3.0 on a 4.0 scale, in all subject areas, in order to be eligible to apply.
 - *Students must also maintain Meeting Standards (3.0) on all College and Career Readiness Standards.
- Review of discipline and attendance records by administration for approval
- Application for acceptance which includes letters of recommendation, list of current activities and community service, and essay
- Selection process and induction will take place in the fall for all selected students

Requirements to Maintain Membership Once Accepted:

- Fulfill service requirement of 15 hours
- Attend a minimum of 75% of club meetings
- Maintain grade average of 85% B, 3.0 on a 4.0 scale or higher. The student will be placed on probation for one trimester if GPA drops below 3.0. If the GPA returns to 3.0 or above, the probation is ended. If the student's GPA improves, but does not reach 3.0, the probation continues for another trimester. After two trimesters of a GPA below 3.0 and/or no improvement shown in GPA, the student may be dismissed from NJHS
- Maintain character status: Student will be placed on probation after receipt of an after-school detention, Saturday detention, and/or AEP; student will be evaluated by the faculty council and possibly suspended from NJHS upon receipt of an after-school detention, Saturday detention, and/or AEP. An out-of-school suspension will result in an automatic review from the faculty council with possible suspension and/or removal from NJHS. In addition, an administrative discipline review may be done at any time for accumulation of incidents, resulting in possible suspension and/or removal from the society.

ARRIVAL AND DISMISSAL PROCEDURES

The Middle School day is as follows for all grades 4 - 8: 8:00 am - 2:20 pm

Students will enter and exit through the same door designated for each grade level:

•	4th Grade:	Students are to enter and exit the building on Jordan Road at Door 4
•	5th Grade:	Students are to enter and exit the building on Jordan Road at Door 2
•	6th Grade:	Students are to enter and exit the building on Jordan Road at Door 1
•	7th Grade:	Students are to enter and exit the building on Tenth Street at Door 7
•	8th Grade:	Students are to enter and exit the building on Tenth Street at Door 9

ARRIVAL

Students are not to arrive at school earlier than 7:50 am. Doors will not open until 7:50 am. There is no supervision before that time

*At 8:00 am, all doors will be locked and students must enter the building through Door 1, the main office entrance on Jordan Road.

Pull your vehicle all the way up to allow for numerous cars to drop off simultaneously. Please do this as quickly as possible to keep the line moving. Have all school materials, including backpack and lunch, ready before the student exits the vehicle. Please park in a legal spot if you need to exit your car for any pre-scheduled meeting.

*Once students arrive at school, they are not allowed to leave school grounds for any reason unless permission is obtained from the Principal or they are signed out by a parent/guardian. Students are encouraged to take advantage of our breakfast program offered daily in the cafeteria. *Parents are never to exit the car.

DISMISSAL

Students are dismissed for the day at 2:20 pm. Students should exit the school building no later than 2:40 pm. Please see the designated doors as assigned to each grade level above.

Only students given permission through previously scheduled events, such as athletics, clubs, extracurricular activities, detentions, extra assistance, or arrangements with teachers, can remain in the building after that time.

Any pick up prior to 2:20 pm will require the parent/guardian to sign the student out of school from the main office. **REMEMBER:**

- Follow all directions from school safety personnel. They can see potential problems you may not.
- Always walk and cross streets with the crossing guards and in the crosswalks.
- Students should wear helmets while riding bikes, maintaining safe routes and following all signs and safety procedures.
- Playing on the playground area is prohibited prior to school arrival and after school dismissal.
- Students are to be dropped off and picked up promptly, as no outside supervision is provided before and after school, except for dismissing classroom students.

ATTENDANCE

ABSENCES

Good attendance is necessary for a successful school experience and building positive habits for adulthood. Pupils shall be subjected to the school district response for unexcused absences during the school year as outlined in NJAC 6A:16-7.8 (a) 4 and Somers Point District Policy Regulation 5200.

- Students shall attend school daily unless the absence is in the category of excused absence.
- Parents shall ensure that their child attends school punctually and daily and be aware of all absences.
- Parents shall notify the school the morning of the absence by telephone by 8:30 a.m. If such notice is not received, the school shall make every attempt to contact the parents on the day of the absence.
- When the student returns to school, he/she shall bring a signed note from the parent explaining the reason for the absence.
- The school administration may also require additional verification from the parent such as a physician's note or court subpoena.
- Parents will receive notification for the following absences
 - 4th absence letter to parent
 - 7th absence letter to parent
 - 10th absence letter to parent, call from Attendance Officer or designee
 - 15th absence letter to parent, call from Attendance Officer, Principal, Counselor, or designee
 - 19th absence letter to parent as notification that legal action will occur upon 20th absence
- Students who have excessive absences (20 or more days) are subject to possible retention and/or legal action. The district Attendance Officer may visit their home to verify attendance.
- If a student is absent from school, he/she may not participate in any after school activities, dances, or school-sponsored activities that day.

EXCUSED ABSENCES

The only absences considered to be "excused" as outlined by the New Jersey Department of Education are as follows:

- Take Your Child To Work Day
- Religious Holidays as outlined by the NJDOE

These absences are considered exempt days when calculating a student's attendance average.

UNEXCUSED ABSENCES

"Unexcused absence" is a pupil's absence for all or part of a school day for any reason other than those listed above.

TRUANCY

"Truancy" is a pupil's absence from all or a part of the school day without the knowledge of the parent or guardian . Unexcused absence from school is a serious offense against school policy and state code. Consequences as per our discipline code will be enforced. Repeated truancy will result in legal action.

TARDINESS

Promptness to school helps ensure students receive the full benefit of our program. If a student is late for school, a parent must sign them in or submit a note of explanation to the main office. **Students are subject to disciplinary consequences for continued unexcused tardiness to school.**

EARLY DISMISSAL POLICY

Parents/guardians are urged to allow students to attend the full day. If a child does need an early dismissal, a note should be sent to the office or a phone call request made prior to the dismissal time. All parents must come into the main office and sign out their child/children at the time requested. Students will not be called to the main office until parent/guardian has arrived. Students will only be released to the parents/guardians unless another adult is specifically listed on the student's emergency contact list. Positive identification may be required of any person meeting a student. Copies of restraining orders or custody orders must be submitted to the main office in order to be enforced.

CANCELLATIONS/DELAYED OPENINGS/EARLY DISMISSAL

School may be canceled, delayed, or dismissed early due to weather or other emergency conditions. Students and parents are expected to plan in advance for this possibility and discuss what to do and where to go in case of a late opening or early dismissal. When severe weather creates hazardous conditions, the regular school schedule may be suspended to ensure student safety. The school will attempt to inform parents of emergency school closings using the Global Connect telephone outreach system. However, it remains the parents'/guardians' responsibility to monitor news reports via television and radio stations for emergency closing announcements. Emergency announcements are normally broadcast between 6:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. The following stations will announce school closures:

Students and families are also encouraged to check the Somers Point School District website and Facebook page for information.

TRANSPORTATION

Somers Point School District is a walking district for students located within the two-mile required distance of the school. Limited bus transportation is provided for designated students based on residency location and individual needs. Pupils are not permitted to ride on the bus unless they have been assigned to transportation by the District Office. Riding the school bus is a privilege. It is imperative that all students observe the rules of proper conduct while riding the bus and comply with the requests of the driver. Failure to comply with rules and procedures may result in a disciplinary consequence or loss of bus privileges. The parent/guardian is responsible to provide and arrange for transportation if their student is excluded from transportation for disciplinary reasons. Students are expected to behave as follows:

- Remain seated at all times while the bus is moving until you reach your destination.
- Each student will receive a seat assignment. This assignment may be changed only by the administration or transportation coordinator.
- Walk towards a waiting bus without pushing.
- Board the bus in an orderly manner.
- Keep all body parts inside the bus and never out the window.
- Loud talking, yelling, inappropriate language and playing of music by students on the bus is distracting to the driver and prohibited. Playing music is also prohibited.
- No eating of food or drinking of beverages on the bus.
- No gum chewing.
- No throwing, acquiring or dropping any objects in the bus or out of the windows at any time.
- Skateboards may not be brought on the bus to school. Drivers will not transport students with skateboards.
- Students may only get off at their designated bus stop unless approved by the principal.

CAFETERIA

Breakfast and hot or cold lunch is available every day in the school cafeteria. Monthly menus are distributed prior to the beginning of each month. Free and reduced lunches are available for families who qualify. **Food service applications are available only online**.

Student behavior in the cafeteria should be based on school behavior expectations, courtesy, and cleanliness. All food and drinks must remain in the cafeteria. Students are also expected to travel to and from the cafeteria in an orderly manner to ensure that the academic classes in session are not disturbed. Students are expected to clean up their own trash and debris from the tables and the floor.

In order to maintain an orderly atmosphere in the cafeteria, the following practices must be followed:

- Everyone should go to his/her table quickly and quietly. Students are not to get up and walk around the cafeteria without permission from the supervising staff. Students should find a staff member for assistance.
- Tables will be sent to the food lines when each one becomes quiet and orderly.
- Students should follow the traffic pattern set by the teachers. Five students are permitted inside the food service area at one time.
- Students are expected to clean up the area and dispose of trash properly.
- There is to be no throwing of food or other objects.

- There is to be a reasonable level of noise in the cafeteria.
- No personal contact, including pushing, fighting or horseplay of any type; no running in the cafeteria.
- No student will leave the cafeteria without a hall pass or bathroom pass and permission from the supervising staff.

BREAKFAST / LUNCH PROGRAM

Breakfast will be served daily at school. Students may purchase breakfast each morning in the school cafeteria from 7:50 a.m. - 8:00 a.m. before school begins. Students eligible for free and reduced lunch are also eligible for free and reduced breakfast.

EMERGENCY INFORMATION

For the protection of a pupil's health and welfare, the parents or legal guardians of a pupil are required to provide emergency information. Parents are expected to update all student information online on the school's student information system. Any change of address or telephone number is to be reported to the main office immediately after the change has taken place. A document proving the change of address will be required - e.g. lease, mortgage, etc. Students will be released only to persons designated on the student's emergency contact information.

HEALTH SERVICES

School health services are conducted for the following purposes:

- Care of emergency sickness or injury in school.
- Prevention and control of communicable diseases.
- Determination of health needs for students.
- Follow up and interpretation of health needs for parents.
- Scoliosis screenings grades 4, 6, 8
- Vision and hearing screenings grades 4, 6, 8
- Physicals for all students participating in interscholastic sports

<u>Please note</u>: If a physical exam is indicated and you do not wish to have this done by the school physician, it must be done at your own expense.

MEDICATION AT SCHOOL

Medication in school is given only when necessary. Students are not to have any medication, prescription or over-the-counter, in their possession at school for any reason, including aspirin, Tylenol, Motrin, Advil, etc. If it is necessary for a student to take medication on a regular basis during school hours, the certified school nurse or a parent/guardian is the only person permitted to administer medication in the school. Medication may only be dispensed by the school nurse under the following guidelines:

- There must be a written request from the parent/guardian.
- A doctor must provide written orders for all medications both over the counter and prescribed.
- Medication must be brought to the school by the parent/guardian in the original container and kept in the nurse's office. Students who use inhalers for treatment of asthma may carry and self-administer their medication if they have their doctor's permission. Forms for this privilege must be filled out by both the parent/guardian and the physician and will be kept on record in the nurse's office.

^{**}Failure to comply with these guidelines will result in disciplinary action, including assigned seats, cafeteria exclusion or detention.

TELEPHONE USE

Students are to report to the main office to request making any necessary emergency phone calls home. In case of emergency or under the direct supervision of a teacher, support staff member, or administration, students may use school phones located in the main office. All calls regarding illness or injury should be handled through the nurse's office.

VISITORS

All visitors are to enter the building through the Main Office. To maintain the safety and security of the school, all visitors must enter through the main entrance and obtain a visitor's badge before going to another location in the building. No visitor is permitted to go directly to a classroom without first signing in and/or obtaining permission from the administration.

SCHOOL SECURITY DRILLS

School security drills, including fire drills, lockdowns, evacuations, reverse evacuations, shelter in place drills, bomb threats, active shooter drills, etc., are required by law and are held twice a month in an effort to maintain order and awareness in case of an emergency. Students are to follow directions given verbally by the teachers and staff members and written on the instructions posted in each classroom near the door. Students are to leave and re-enter the building in an orderly manner. All school security drills are to be conducted as if they were real emergency situations. Always follow the instructions of staff members concerning the place to line up outside the building. Students must remain quiet in class groups so that the teacher can account for all students. Tampering with the fire drill system or phoning in a false 911 call to the Police Department will result in long-term suspension and notification of the authorities.

BICYCLES

Bicycles may be ridden to school and must be locked to the bike rack during the school day. Bike racks for students in grades 4, 5, and 6 are located near the playground on the Jordan Road side of the school. Bike racks for students in grades 7 and 8 are located on the Tenth Street side of the building. **Students are to walk their bicycles while on school property.** Driveways, parking lots, and sidewalks at the school are heavy traffic areas. Abusing safety rules may result in the student being denied bike privileges. The school and district does not assume responsibility for any damaged or stolen bicycles.

All students riding their bikes to school must submit a "Bicycle Use Contract" signed by both the student and their parent/guardian. The Bicycle Safety Form is available on the Jordan Road School website, in the Main Office. Students and their parents assume a joint responsibility in care of property, observance of safety rules, and display of courtesy and consideration toward others associated with bicycle riding and use. This information is outlined in policy 5514 and 5514.1. The Board of Education does not assume any responsibility for bicycles or property that is lost, stolen, or damaged. Students who ride their bikes to school and do not wear a helmet may face disciplinary consequences and possible referral to the Somers Point Police Department.

BOOKBAGS / BACKPACKS / PURSES

Students may use bookbags, backpacks, and/or purses to carry belongings to and from school. Students are encouraged to carry gym clothing to and from PE class in a plastic drawstring or cloth bag. The school does not assume any responsibility for any property that is lost, stolen, or damaged.

CHROMEBOOKS / TEXTBOOKS

Every student is responsible for their district-issued chromebook and/or textbooks. Books and devices should be treated with care. The condition of all materials will be evaluated before they are issued to a student at the beginning of the school year. They will then be re-evaluated for any damage when they are returned at the end of the school year. Students will be charged for any damages that may occur to their school-issued materials. All lost or damaged materials will be paid for by the student or student's parents/guardians, or report cards and/or graduation diplomas will be held until the fine is paid. Materials may not be transferred from one student to another except by the teacher.

LOCKERS

Sixth, seventh, and eighth grade students are assigned a locker. Teachers will inform students of the appropriate times to visit their lockers during the school day. Students are requested to keep lockers clean, neat, and damage free. Decals, stick-ons, double sided tape, and writing are not permitted inside a locker. Decorations of any kind are not permitted on the outside of the locker. You are cautioned that everything in the locker is the responsibility of the student. The administration strongly advises that students do not take any valuable items to school or share locker combinations with any other students. This may result in the loss, damage, or theft of books, clothes, electronics, etc., for which you remain responsible. Lockers are the property of the Somers Point School District and are subject to search by administration or school officials at any time in the interest of the safety and security of the school, its students, and its staff. The Somers Point School District does not assume responsibility for any personal items or property in lockers that may be lost, stolen, or damaged.

PERSONAL PROPERTY

Students are advised not to bring large sums of money, valuable jewelry, card sets, electronics, or similar items to school. The school and district does not assume any responsibility for the loss, damage, or theft of any personal property. Lost or missing items should be reported immediately to a teacher or an administrator.

LOST AND FOUND

Students who have lost articles should check in the Lost and Found area during lunch. Students who find items should submit them to the main office for safekeeping until the proper owner has been identified.

Items will be displayed in the lost and found area. After 30 days unclaimed articles will be donated to charity or discarded. We strongly suggest that lunch boxes, backpacks, and student's apparel be marked with the student's name for identification.

SEARCH AND SEIZURE

School authorities have both the moral and legal responsibility to maintain order and decorum in the schools and to protect the students from harming themselves or others. A Principal or his designee may find it necessary to search students and remove from their possession items, which may be potentially harmful. School lockers and desks remain the property of the district, even when used by pupils. Lockers and desks are subject to administrative inspection in the interest of school safety, sanitation, discipline, and the enforcement of school regulations and to a search by law enforcement officials.

GUIDANCE

School counselors offer students strategies and tools that will assist their academic, social, emotional, and developmental needs by: helping students set academic and personal goals; being an active listener; helping students learn to make healthy choices; answering questions parents have about school; assisting students with conflict resolution; acting as a liaison between students, teachers, and parents; and guiding students through a successful school year.

The grade responsibilities of the guidance department at Jordan Road Middle School are:

Ms. Carley Cross: Counselor grade 4

Mr. Jim Scarano: Counselor grades 5 - 6, JRMS Anti-Bullying Specialist

Mr. Joseph Schmidt: Counselor grades 7 - 8, SPSD Student Assistance Coordinator, JRMS Testing Coordinator

The Guidance Department exists for the benefit of every student. This department exists to help students and parents cope with the transition concerns, which are normally found in the middle school population. Our Guidance Counselors offer students strategies and tools that will assist their academic, social, emotional and developmental needs. Through classroom guidance instruction and student counseling (individually or in a small group) students will have the opportunity to learn about important topics such as self-awareness, friendship, positive decision making, conflict resolution and responsibility. Students should see a counselor when they need information about their schedule, have academic problems, have problems with other students, or have family concerns. Students will receive a Guidance office appointment pass in homeroom or they can ask their teachers for a Guidance Counselor Request form.

JORDAN ROAD MIDDLE SCHOOL COUNSELING PROGRAM

Individual Counseling:

School Counselors meet individually with students to provide support for school-related issues and emotional problems that are impacting a student's ability to learn. Students may refer themselves to the counselor or may be referred by parents, teachers, or other school staff. Written and/or verbal permission is required for ongoing individual counseling.

Small Group Guidance:

Small groups can be for <u>everyone</u> and a referral for participation does not necessarily indicate a problem. All students benefit from learning how to accept responsibility, manage stress, communicate effectively, make good decisions, and problem solve! Groups meet for 30 minutes during school hours for approximately 6-8 weeks. Parents will be notified when their child has been chosen for participation in a group.

Consultation:

Counselors act as consultants primarily to help students, parents, and teachers to be more effective in working with others. Consultation helps students, parents, and teachers think through problems and concerns, as well as acquire additional knowledge and skills in order to become more objective.

Coordination/Referral:

Counselors serve as a liaison between parents, teachers, support personnel, and community resources to facilitate successful student development. As student advocates, counselors often refer students to appropriate resources.

Guidance Curriculum:

The guidance curriculum covers the areas of academic, career, and personal/social development. Counselors often deliver the curriculum in large group settings, such as classroom presentations, which offer the best opportunity to provide guidance to the largest number of students in our school.

Guidance Office Appointment Pass:

Students who seem to have a problem of social, emotional, or academic nature are encouraged to seek the services of their counselor. Students should complete a counseling request form and will receive a pass **before** reporting to the Guidance office.

*If it appears as though a situation may need immediate attention, please contact the guidance office or main office for assistance. School Counselor Referral Forms and Intervention and Referral Services Team Referral forms are available in the guidance offices/online if a teacher wishes to refer a student to the guidance office.

JFS SUPPORT CENTER:

Jewish Family Services (JFS) is available on-site at Jordan Road School offering individual, group, and/or family therapies to students of Jordan Road and Dawes Avenue Schools. Consent is required for participation in any one of these services. Services are confidential and will not be discussed with the school unless you have provided consent for JFS to do so. All services are provided at no cost to the families. Neither you nor your insurance company will be billed for these services. Services are provided by licensed, Masters-level therapists. In addition, all services are supervised by a Licensed Psychologist with over two decades of experience working with youth and families. Please take advantage of this opportunity to receive high-quality, accessible services in your neighborhood. Let us know if you have any questions and a Somers Point School Counselor or member of the JFS team will answer them.

ADVISORY PROGRAM

Our middle school advisory program has been established to create a small group setting where each student will be provided with the opportunity to build a trusting relationship with at least one adult within the school community. Through meaningful activities and discussion, students and advisors will focus on meeting the needs of the challenging issues that middle school students face today. Furthermore, students will observe effective interpersonal communication skills modeled by both their advisor and their peers. In order to promote an individual's personal health, safety, growth, and success, one needs to be in an environment where recognition, reinforcement, encouragement, and motivation can take place. This can be accomplished by implementing a comprehensive advisory program. Advisory groups meet once a week for 30-40 minutes. On those days, students follow an alternate schedule.

MULTI-TIERED SYSTEM OF SUPPORT (MTSS) / RESPONSE TO INTERVENTION (RTI)

Response to Intervention, commonly known as RTI, is a multi-tiered approach to the early identification and support of students with learning and behavior needs. The RTI process begins with high-quality instruction and universal screening of all children in the general education classroom. Struggling learners are provided with interventions at increasing levels of intensity to accelerate their learning. These services are provided by a variety of personnel, including general education teachers, special educators, and specialists. Progress is closely monitored to assess both the learning rate and level of performance of individual students. Educational decisions about the intensity and duration of interventions are based on individual student response to instruction. RTI is designed for use when making decisions in both general education and special education, creating a well-integrated system of instruction and intervention guided by child outcome data.

JOSTEN'S RENAISSANCE PROGRAM

Somers Point School District participates in the Josten's Renaissance National Program, working toward a positive climate and culture, resulting in the development of each student into a successful, thriving individual. The way the school looks, the achievements that are recognized and the way people treat each other are all unmistakable. You can sense a shared understanding of what the school values. And, maybe most importantly, you can tell that it's a place where students and educators truly want to be. For over 25 years, Jostens Renaissance Education has helped schools across North America renew their climate and culture. This contributes to increased attendance and graduation rates, improved academic performance and behavior, higher teacher retention rates, and a boost in overall school spirit. The Renaissance Formula is as follows: When students and educators work together to RESPECT student character, academic excellence, and Staffulty, and when they RECOGNIZE, REWARD, and REINFORCE achievements in these areas in fun and meaningful ways and build RELATIONSHIPS, that leads to RESULTS.

TIME TO TEACH

Among all the responsibilities that teachers have, two are paramount; implementing the curriculum and managing their classroom. Neither is more important, nor can one be effective without the other.

Teachers will not be effective as instructional leaders unless they connect with students on a human level, accept students with "unconditional regard," set appropriate limits and communicate high expectations. Relationships are keystone to a well-run classroom. The wise words of Madeline Hunter ring true: "Kids don't care how much you know until they know how much you care."

Teachers will continue to implement the classroom management program known as Time To Teach. Time To Teach is a research based program that addresses low level behaviors which impact student learning within the classroom. It is designed to recover precious instructional time and improve a school's climate by focusing on the social/emotional well-being of its students through direct instruction.

We believe that maximum learning will occur when students not only know how to behave, but also want to pay attention and behave. Time To Teach uses practical, proven strategies that foster optimal learning behaviors in diverse classrooms.

Additionally, we hope to incorporate some of these same strategies in the lunchroom, on the playground and on the buses.

As always, positive student behavior is the result of a successful, supportive, working relationship between Staffulty and parents. We encourage and welcome parents to be an active participant and partner in student behavior expectations.

JAGUAR PRIDE

Jaguar Pride is an enrichment program which is designed to empower students and staff by publicly celebrating hard work, perseverance, and good character through the uplifting energy of awards and accolades. It is a journey and not a destination. It believes in not only today but in the potential of tomorrow. Together students, staff, parents, administrators, and community leaders share in the fun and passion for excellence in education.

VISION: The primary goal of the Jaguar Pride program is to celebrate student performance, increase student and staff enthusiasm, and raise the level of community participation in schools.

DRESS CODE

Students are encouraged to use good judgment when dressing for school. The school's intent in establishing a dress standard consistent with the rulings made by the Commissioner of Education is to promote a positive attitude about learning and about one's self, as well as to eliminate distractions to the educational process. Studies have shown that those who dress appropriately for school come with a more positive attitude and feeling of pride, resulting in better behavior, greater school spirit, and higher academic achievement.

In accordance with policy 5511, a student's dress and grooming should not affect the educational program of the school. Pupils may not wear clothing or engage in grooming practices that present a health or safety hazard to the individual pupil or to others; materially interfere with school work, create disorder, or disrupt the educational program; cause excessive wear or damage to school property; or prevent the pupil from achieving his or her own educational objectives because of blocked vision or restricted movement. The building principal shall determine whether the dress or grooming of pupils comes within these prohibitions.

DRESS CODE

- A. General rules:
 - Pupils are expected to be clean and well-groomed in their appearance.
 - Pupils are expected to avoid extremes in appearance that are so disruptive or distracting that the reaction of other pupils is disruptive to the education process.
 - Dress or grooming that jeopardizes the health or safety of the pupil or is injurious to school property will not be permitted.
- B. Prohibited clothing and articles:

The following limitations will be made for student clothing:

- 1. Clothing which leaves the midriff and/or back exposed. The bottom of the upper garment should meet the top of the lower garment. Bare midriffs or bare sides should not show even when arms are fully extended and raised in the air.
- 2. Extremely tight fitting, transparent, or suggestive clothes. Leggings and yoga pants should be covered by a long shirt or dress.
- 3. Halter tops, sheer tops, low neckline (necklines that show cleavage), low back line, bare midriff, tank tops with shoulder straps less than two inches wide., shoulderless or spaghetti strap garments. Tank tops should not have wide openings for the arms that expose undergarments or an excessive amount of skin. Undergarments must not be visible.
- 4. Short shorts, mini skirts, and/or dresses. Appropriate shorts and skirts are to be no shorter than the middle of the thigh.
- 5. Pajama tops and/or bottoms, sleep bottoms, slippers, and/or blankets...
- 6. Hats, hoods, and/or any headwear that covers the student's face or causes a disruption to the learning environment. Any medical need for sunglasses must be accompanied by a note from a physician.
- 7. Coats or jackets of any length without permission from a teacher and/or administrator.
- 8. Bare feet, unsafe footwear, slippers, or shoes with cleats. Footwear should remain firmly attached to the foot. No platforms or heels above 2 inches are permitted.
- 9. Garments with graphics that suggest obscene or offensive material which detracts from the educational process and is therefore deemed inappropriate. Examples include, but are not limited to:
 - a. Drawings and/or slogans that are perceived as discriminatory in nature.
 - b. Drawings and/or slogans that promote the use of drugs, alcohol, and/or tobacco.
 - c. Profanity and/or sexual references.
 - d. Drawings and/or slogans advocating violence or displaying weapons.
 - e. Crude drawings and/or phrases.
 - f. Drawings and/or slogans displaying gang affiliation.
 - g. Double meanings.
- 10. Any type of clothing apparel or accessory which indicates gang affiliation.
- 11. Undergarments showing or worn as outer garments.
- 12. Pants worn below the waist/hip line. Undergarments should not be exposed.
- 13. Writing across the seat of pants/shorts.
- 14. Clothing that is overly soiled, torn, worn or defaced.
- 15. Any rips in pants or jeans that are above mid-thigh, exposing skin.
- 16. Jewelry that may cause a safety concern such as pointed bracelets, collars, and/or wallet chains.
- 17. Costumes, masks, and/or face/body paint of any kind.
- 18. Any garment, attire, or style of grooming that disrupts the educational environment.

UNAUTHORIZED SALES

^{*}All enforcement of the dress code is subject to administrative discretion. Teachers and administration will take appropriate action in any situation in which attire is judged to be indecent, dangerous, or which distracts and interferes with the educational process. Students will have the opportunity to change their clothing and/or call home for a change of clothes. Students refusing to comply with the dress code requests will be sent home and/or may receive disciplinary consequences.

Students are not permitted to sell items in school to other students and/or staff members for outside organizations, community sport leagues, personal gain, or for any other fundraiser or reason that has not been approved by the school.

HALL PASSES

Students will be required to use a designated pass when leaving class. No student is permitted in the bathrooms without permission from a teacher and a pass.

CELL PHONES / ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Cell phones are permitted in school once a parent and child sign an Acceptable Cell Phone Use Agreement. During school hours from 8:00 am to 2:20 pm, all cell phones must be turned off and out of sight. Any student who chooses to violate this policy will have the phone confiscated and given to the Principal/Assistant Principal. Disciplinary consequences will be issued according to the Code of Conduct. Repeat offenses may result in additional consequences, such as a parent conference with the Principal. The school is **not** responsible for any loss, theft, or destruction of a student's cell phone.

Inappropriate text messaging, whether taking place in or out of school, may be addressed by the student code of conduct. Texting during school hours is not permitted in any case. Likewise, students may not take unauthorized pictures at school or forward any inappropriate messages that refer to school, students, or personnel.

TECHNOLOGY USE

Somers Point School students have privilege and ability to access thousands of libraries, databases, and information sites throughout the world. In order to ensure technology is being used in an acceptable manner and for educational purposes, an Acceptable Use Policy has been adopted by the Somers Point School District. All students and their parents and/or guardians will be asked to review and sign this document at the beginning of the school year. Any student who fails to return the signed document will have no access to the available technology until this signed form is returned to the school. Any violations of the Acceptable Use Policy will result in disciplinary action and/or loss of use. The Technology Acceptable Use Policy Form is available on the Jordan Road Middle School website and in the Main Office.

The following actions are not permitted and will not be tolerated:

- Sharing of accounts, IDs or passwords
- Sending or displaying offensive messages or pictures
- Using obscene language
- Harassing, insulting or attacking others
- Damaging computers, computer systems or computer networks
- Violating copyright laws
- Using another's password
- Trespassing in another subdirectory's work or files
- Intentionally wasting limited resources
- Employing the network for commercial purposes
- Making threats through electronic communication
- Use of social networking sites and /or proxies

HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION, AND BULLYING (HIB)

Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying is outlined in our district policy 5512. Upon completion of an HIB investigation, any student confirmed by the district to participate in any form of harassment, intimidation, and/or bullying will receive discipline according to the student code of conduct. This information will also be reported to the state of NJ.

Please contact Mr. James Scarano, our school's Anti-Bullying Specialist (ext. 1220), or Mrs. Melanie Wagner, Assistant Principal (ext. 1253), if you have any behavior concerns that may be considered to be HIB occurring at Jordan Road Middle School. You can also contact the District's Anti-Bullying Coordinator.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

Sexual harassment is any unwanted and/or uninvited verbal or physical behavior of a sexual nature, which results in physical harm or causes a person to feel uncomfortable or threatened. Sexual harassment can be, but is not limited to, the following examples:

Physical:

- Forcibly grabbing or kissing someone
- Touching someone in an inappropriate way
- Making sexual gestures
- Licking lips or making suggestive body movements
- Staring at someone's body

Verbal:

- Commenting about someone's body
- Talking about someone's sexual orientation in a way that makes the person uncomfortable

The severity of the disciplinary action will be based upon the circumstances of the infraction. The severity of the discipline action may range from detention to suspension or extended discipline based on a board of education hearing. In addition, charges may be filed with the police.

DRUGS, ALCOHOL, AND TOBACCO

Any student suspected of being under the influence of any of the above substances on school property or any school sponsored event shall immediately be taken through the mandated steps as outlined in the New Jersey Administrative Code title 6:29-6. (available upon request) under Somers Point Board of Education policies and procedures. These include immediate notification of Administration, Parents, Superintendent and immediate referral to a medical facility for examination and drug screening. The students will receive disciplinary consequences as noted in the code of conduct and district policy. Upon return to school, the student will be scheduled to meet with the Substance Awareness Coordinator.
