Bullying Redefined...

- Single incident or series of incidents (gestures, written, verbal, physical, electronic communication)
- Motivated by any characteristic
- On or off school grounds if it interferes with rights of student
- Creates a hostile educational environment

The New Bullying Process

Bullying Reported

Investigation begins within 1 day of report

Parent notified

Investigation completed within 10 days. Code of conduct enforced and remediation provided depending on findings.

Submitted to Superintendent within 2 days of completed investigation

Superintendent reports investigations at the next Board Meeting

Parents notified by Superintendent of outcome within 5 days of Board Meeting

Bullying vs. Conflict: What's the difference?

Conflict	Bullying
Mutually competitive or opposing action or engagement.	Bullying is one-sided.
• Includes disagreements, arguments and fights.	One or more students are victims of one or more person's aggression
 A normal part of growing up and of life. 	• The intent is to physically or emotionally hurt someone
